Further to below, for bump out we are:

- Providing an additional 21 buses to run shuttles
- 2 additional GamesLing accessible mini buses
- Additional accessible maxi taxis on standby
- Extra rail service at 1.15am all stops to Brisbane from Nerang (effectively a sweeper service)
- 6 extra rail services south from Nerang to Varsity Lakes between 22.27 and 00.37 (due to heavier than expected passenger loadings from varsity lakes)
- 10 logan coaches buses from Beenleigh to drop people off at stations between Beenleigh and Park Road (in addition to Beenleigh line rail services)
- 2 extra trams between 11 and 11.30 and as required after 11.30pm
- 10 buses from Roma St for all other suburban rail lines to meet last trains (this is standard as part of the integrated plan)

Hi All

Just some fast facts below.

Heavy rail performed exceptionally, moving a large number of passengers, all on time without any dramas.

Some reports about queuing for buses at Broadbeach, however wait times being reported are very inaccurate – Brock is onto this in terms of media. Extra buses were deployed and it was cleared well in advance of 7pm of anyone who was waiting before then.

Dress rehearsals and modelling showed Surfers would be the busier bus hub, but it appears people just stayed on the light rail, so will adjust bus deployment accordingly. It is anticipated that some people may head into Surfers to celebrate afterwards too, so will monitor closely.

Bump out brief underway and will provide a further update prior to end of ceremony.

Ingress

- As at 7pm:
 - 10,000+ heavy rail passengers were moved from Brisbane to Nerang, including Games workforce. Biggest loadings at Park Road and Beenleigh.
 - Approximately 5000 heavy rail passengers were moved from Varsity to Nerang.

To note

• At 5.40pm s78B(2) contacted the GOC quoting 2 hour delays for customers from Millaroo PnR requiring accessible transport to Carrara. This would mean someone had been waiting since at least 3.40pm which isn't correct. We have impacted customer's name and number and contact will be made with him tomorrow (unable to contact now as he's at the Opening Ceremony currently). Low floor buses are being provided on a priority basis to Park and Rides and Transit Hubs, and GTPT have confirmed accessible taxis provided at Millaroo PnR as required tonight.

Egress

- 10 buses at Beenleigh will be on standby to provide infill services to people who want to get to stations on the Beenleigh line that don't have the express stop
- All other rail patrons travel to Roma St and catch either connecting trains/nightlink buses depending on what time they get in
- In addition to the extra GC-Bris rail services already on, Qld Rail have scheduled another service at 1.08am in anticipation
- There will be additional accessible taxis to assist with egress, with patrons to go to the
 accessible transport line (well signed) at Carrara as well as 6 additional low floor buses

SALLY Pearson is out of the Commonwealth Games.

In a shattering blow for the Games organisers, the local pin-up girl has succumbed to a Achilles injury and won't defend her 100m hurdles crown.

It's understood the injury flared again after Pearson ran a relay leg in Brisbane last week.

She has been unable to train properly for the past two months but had been hoping for a positive turn of events late which never happened.

Pearson was the final relay runner in last night's Opening Ceremony and had been the face of the Games ever since the Gold Coast was named as the 2018 host city.

The 31-year-old has been plagued by injury since she won her second Commonwealth crown in Glasgow in 2014.

- We thank everyone for their patience last night as our hard-working staff and transport network moved more than 30,000 people to and from Carrara Stadium for the Opening Ceremony.
- As with any event of this size and significance, it is common for spectators to experience queues
 due to the large number of people departing from a single point at the same time.
- As soon as the Opening Ceremony finished last night we began moving spectators quickly and safely home, ensuring that no one was left behind.
- While there were certainly lessons learned which we will apply for future GC2018 events, we are
 pleased we got everyone into Carrara stadium, in time for the opening ceremony, and then home
 again safely afterwards.

Pre event

- The heavy rail network performed to plan last night with approximately 10,000 people travelling from Brisbane and approximately 5000 from Varsity Lakes.
- A total of 274 buses carried approximately 24,900 spectators to the stadium over 415 trips.
- This is a great achievement for our dedicated staff across the network who were able to make sure spectators arrived as quickly as possible and of course, on time for the ceremony.

Nerang Station

- We are aware some spectators experienced delays travelling from Nerang station to Carrara Stadium for the Opening Ceremony yesterday afternoon.
- · Games shuttle bus services were originally scheduled based on the venue opening at 5pm.
- The first shuttle bus was scheduled to depart Nerang station at 4.53pm, however a number of spectators arrived early.
- We were able to identify this in real time at our Transport Coordination Centre and quickly deployed several additional bus services to assist these passengers.

Broadbeach South Station

- We are aware some spectators experienced delays travelling on public transport from Broadbeach South station for the Opening Ceremony last night.
- We identified this in real time at our Transport Coordination Centre and deployed a total of 23 additional bus services to respond to the high demand.
- We were able to respond to this quickly with support from 42 staff on the ground at the station.
- Spectators were cleared from Broadbeach South Station by 6.45pm.

Post event

- As soon as the ceremony finished, we began moving spectators quickly and safely home.
- Our hard-working staff and public transport network moved more than 30,000 spectators to and from Carrara Stadium for the Opening Ceremony – the largest ever crowd.

Day One

- · We are now in day one of competition, with a total of eight venues active across the Gold Coast.
- More than 100,000 spectators are expected to attend sporting events today, along with approximately 30,000 people expected to attend Festival 2018.

Public nuisance charges, Carrara - QPS

- Police have charged three people after an alleged incident at Carrara Stadium following a protest at the Opening Ceremony of the Gold Coast 2018 Commonwealth Games.
- Around 7.30pm, a group of people was protesting in a carpark outside of the stadium.
- It will be alleged that some protestors attempted to gain unauthorised entry into the venue.
- A 20-year-old Northern Territory man was charged with one count of public nuisance and is due
 to appear in the Southport Magistrates Court on May 3.
- Two Queensland women aged 21 and 30 were both charged with one count each of public nuisance. The women are due to appear in the Southport Magistrates Court on April 23.
- The Queensland Police Service respects the right of people to protest lawfully and peacefully in Queensland but will not tolerate disruptive behaviour during the Commonwealth Games and associated events.

Police traffic incident - QPS

- Around 7.30 last night, two police motorcycles that were travelling as both as part of and in advance of the motorcade of Their Royal Highnesses The Prince of Wales and The Duchess of Cornwall collided on the Gold Coast Highway at Southport.
- Both officers were transported to the Gold Coast University Hospital one as a precaution and the other with non-life-threatening injuries.
- When planning the movement of motorcades, we include all contingencies.
- The crash did not impede or impact on the movement of the motorcade to Carrara Stadium and Their Royal Highnesses were conveyed safely to the Opening Ceremony.
- · The Forensic Crash Unit is investigating.
- The injured officers are experienced motorcycle riders and my thoughts are with them and their families and wish them both a speedy recovery.

Security preparedness – QPS

The CGF will maintain an approach of continued vigilance.

<u>IF ASKED – Allegations of indecent assault involving Commonwealth Games delegate – refer to Queensland Police Service</u>

- The Queensland Police Service (QPS) has received a complaint in relation to allegations of an assault involving an international Commonwealth Games delegate.
- Police are investigating the matter.
- As this is an ongoing investigation it is inappropriate to provide further comment at this stage.

IF ASKED - GC2018 program mistake

- GOLDOC is aware of a formatting error in the England team overview section of the official GC2018 Program.
- The formatting error occurred when The Gambia was reinstated back in to the Commonwealth and subsequently the Games only a few weeks ago.

IF ASKED - Confirmed case of mumps in New Zealand Rugby 7s - GOLDOC

- A female athlete from New Zealand has been admitted to the Sunshine Coast University Hospital and is currently receiving treatment for mumps.
- The Athlete has been staying on the Sunshine Coast and has not been in the Commonwealth Games Village. The Athlete has been in isolation since diagnosed.
- GOLDOC is working closely with Public Health and the New Zealand team to proactively manage and reduce the potential for further spread.
- From the Medical Command Centre: Athletes have undergone serology testing. Those that have been found to be non-immune, arrangements are being made to provide vaccinations. Further contact tracing is continuing.

IF ASKED - security guards

- There are sufficient numbers of security guards for the Games. This is a major sporting event and the security operation for the Games is the largest in Australia since the Commonwealth Games in Melbourne in 2006.

GOLDOC statement

"The timing of the injury is unfortunate, and we wish Sally all the best in her recovery as she looks forward to her next challenge."

GCB asking if the Royal motorcade contributed to Carrara transport issues QPS lead:

 are either locally produced, or have ingredients that are locally produced.
- All venues where there are ticketed spectators will offer a variety of food and drink options, right from Gates open all the way to 15 minutes prior to session end.

IF ASKED - Unauthorised ticket sales

- Advertising tickets for resale via unauthorised channels is a prohibited activity.
- Ticket scalping is also illegal and any complaints should be referred to the Queensland Police Service.
- The best advice is to buy tickets for GC2018 is to only 'Buy Official' through the gc2018.com/tickets website.

IF ASKED - arrest of Games official

- Police charged an international Commonwealth Games delegate from Mauritius with sexual assault yesterday.
- It is understand the man is due to appear in Southport Magistrates Court on April 17.
- As the matter is now before the Court it would be inappropriate to comment further.

IF ASKED - Athlete admitted to hospital, treated for malaria, serious condition

- A 23-year-old was admitted to Gold Coast University Hospital on Thursday, 5 April.
- The patient received immediate treatment for malaria on arrival at GCUH.
- The patient remains admitted to GCUH in a serious condition and continues to be closely monitored.
- Malaria is a serious infection spread by mosquitoes in some countries. There is no locally acquired malaria in mainland Australia. We have robust treatments for malaria in Australia.

IF ASKED - new influenza case in the Games Village

- On Friday, there was another confirmed case of influenza within the Commonwealth Games Village.
- The patient has been requested to remain in isolation until they no longer have symptoms and is being managed in conjunction with the Gold Coast Public Health Unit. A preventative course of Tamiflu has been provided for athletes that have been in close contact with the patient.

- The GC2018 Chief Medical Officer would like to thank the team affected for their swift action in containing the virus.
- Earlier in the week there were three other cases of flu reported in the Games Village, however these patients are now considered clear.

IF ASKED - Confirmed case of mumps in New Zealand Rugby 7s - GOLDOC

- A female athlete from New Zealand has been admitted to the Sunshine Coast University Hospital and is currently receiving treatment for mumps.
- The Athlete has been staying on the Sunshine Coast and has not been in the Commonwealth Games Village. The Athlete has been in isolation since diagnosed.
- GOLDOC is working closely with Public Health and the New Zealand team to proactively manage and reduce the potential for further spread.

IF ASKED – Concerns re the beach volleyball team from Grenada (pronounced Gren-ay-da) being delayed enroute to their matches

- GOLDOC has acknowledged a transport issue on Friday April 6 involving the Grenada beach volleyball team and team officials.
- There were no delays to the beach volleyball session and the players arrived in enough time to warm up and take the field ready to play.
- GOLDOC will increase marshalling support at the Athletes' Village to ensure that transport users and drivers are all aware of their destination.

IF ASKED – Australian Government (Border Force) cancelling visas of travellers from various countries including Ghana – as reported by Ghana media

 Issues surrounding visas should be directed to the Australian Government Department of Homes Affairs at media@homeaffairs.gov.au.

IF ASKED - Ongoing planned Indigenous protests

- The GC2018 Games Partners are committed to advancing reconciliation for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Queenslanders. GC2018 is the first major sporting event in Australia to develop a Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) that supports reconciliation efforts, drives economic participation and delivers tangible benefits for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Queenslanders.
- The Queensland Government respects the rights of groups and individuals to express their views in a peaceful manner and we hope this does not detract from this significant event.
- The strong participation of First Nations people in the opening ceremony, throughout the Games and beyond, are among many significant gestures towards reconciliation.

IF ASKED - Empty seats at venues

- GC2018 has sold more than one million tickets across Games events with many events sold out.
- The Optus Aquatic Centre has a capacity of approximately 10,000 and only a limited number of tickets remain for upcoming sessions.
- Typically, the allocation has been exhausted for evening sessions, which include semi and finals.

IF ASKED - Arrests of protestors at Carrara Stadium at Opening Ceremony

- Police on Wednesday (April 4) arrested three people at Carrara Stadium following a protest at the Opening Ceremony of the Gold Coast 2018 Commonwealth Games.
- Around 7.30pm, a man and two women were arrested for public nuisance after they attempted to gain entry to the stadium prior to the Opening Ceremony.
- A 20-year-old Northern Territory man has since been charged with one count of public nuisance and is due to appear in Southport Magistrates Court on May 3.
- Two Queensland women aged 21 and 30 were also both charged with one count of public nuisance and are due to appear in the Southport Magistrates Court on April 23.




